Dr Poelina is a Nyikina Traditional Custodian and Chair of the Martuwarra Fitzroy River Council. Anne is a Peter Cullen Fellow (2011) awarded Laureate Women's World Summit Foundation (Geneva) (2017) and recent Board and Councillor with the Australian Conservation Foundation (ACF), Adjunct Senior Research Fellow with Notre Dame University Broome.

Dr Poelina promotes protecting the health of our rivers' and 'living water systems' as the life blood of our nation. Her work champions the 'New Economy' opportunities for Indigenous people in relation to green collar jobs in diverse, science, culture, heritage and conservation economies. A vital ingredient is to include Indigenous science - traditional ecological knowledge, First Law and the rights of nature to the solutions for planetary health and wellbeing.
